Motor vehicle crashes are the leading cause of death for teenagers. It's a sobering statistic and one reason more parents are looking at high tech ways to keep track of their teenage drivers.

When they get behind the wheel, most teenagers will say they're good drivers. But the fact is, 78 percent of teens in the U.S. get a bicket or crash before the age of 18. And one in 20 are killed or seriously hur in societaris every year.

basically want to see where their child is going - if they are going somewhere where they shouldn't be going, are they speeding." A little black box you install in your vehicle can tell you just that. From there, you go online to track its progress.

"First we can see now where the car is or what it's doing, like these two are stopped are stopped at these addresses," explained Izuka, owner of Security & Sound Systems.

"It also lets you know if the driver is speeding and where. We can see that
